1.0 INTRODUCTION

This policy was formulated by Riverview Educate Together National School in 2022, in accordance with the Department of Education Circular 0052/2019 and relevant guidelines.

2.0 RATIONALE

This policy was drafted following the introduction of new guidelines issued by the Department of Education in September 2019, Circular 0052/2019 is a revision of Circular 12/1996 and forms the basis for this revised school policy. These guidelines have been developed to provide guidance for staff and parents/guardians around the criteria and application process of an exemption from the study of Irish.

The language component of the Primary Curriculum is for all pupils and comprises of both English and Irish. In exceptional circumstances, some pupils may be granted an exemption from the study of Irish.

3.0 RELATIONSHIP TO THE SCHOOL ETHOS

The school promotes positive home-school contacts, not only in relation to the welfare of children, but also in relation to all aspects of school life. This policy is in keeping with the school ethos through the provision of a safe, secure and caring school environment and the furthering of positive home-school links.

4.0 OBJECTIVES

- To allow for pupils for differing abilities, interests and circumstances
- To enhance inclusivity within the school
- To enable children of all abilities to access the curriculum in a learner friendly manner

5.0 CRITERIA FOR EXEMPTION FROM THE STUDY OF IRISH

Since September 2019, with the publishing of Circular 0052/2019, the onus has been placed on schools to ascertain whether a student should qualify for and be granted an exemption from the study of Irish. Exempting a pupil from the study of Irish should be considered only in exceptional circumstances. The decision to exempt a pupil from the study of Irish is an important decision that has implications for his/her access to the curriculum and his/her future learning. The decision to grant an exemption from the study of Irish is made by the principal teacher, but it must be made following detailed discussion with the pupil's parent(s)/guardians(s), the class teacher, special education teachers, and the pupil. The school will follow the procedure directed by circular 0052/2019.

Exemptions are essentially only available to:

- a) Pupils whose education up to 12 years of age (or up to and including the final year of their primary education) was received outside the state and where they did not have an opportunity to engage in the study of Irish.
- b) Pupils who were previously enrolled as recognised pupils in primary schools who are being re-enrolled after a period spent abroad, provided that at least three consecutive years have elapsed since the previous enrolment in the state and they are at least 12 years of age on re-enrolment.
- c) Pupils who:

- I. Have at least reached second class, and
- II. Present with significant learning difficulties that are persistent despite having had access to a differentiated approach to language and literacy learning in both Irish and English over time. Documentary evidence to this effect, held by the school, should include Student Support Plans detailing, regular reviews of learning needs as part of an ongoing cycle of assessment, target-setting and evidence-informed intervention and review, including test scores (word reading, reading comprehension, spelling, other scores of language/literacy) at key points of review, and
- III. At the time of application for exemption present with a standardised score on a discrete test in either Word Reading, Reading Comprehension or Spelling at/below the 10th percentile.

<u>Or</u>

d) Children of foreigners who are diplomatic or consular representatives of Ireland.

6.0 APPLICATION PROCESS

The decision to consider an exemption for any child in our school should only be entered in exceptional circumstances, and where due consideration has been given to the child's future learning.

An examination of whether a student should be considered for an Irish exemption can be started in 3 ways:

- 1. A request from a parent/guardian (Appendix 1).
 - I. Consultation will take place between the School Principal, Support Teacher and class teacher as to whether a student would benefit or not from an Irish exemption. If in the experience of the teachers it is felt they would not benefit, parents will be strongly recommended that an exemption should not be pursued at this time.
 - II. If it is felt the student would benefit from an exemption, the support teacher will ascertain through assessment whether the student fits the testing criteria.
 - III. If the student fits the criteria, the school will begin the formal paperwork process as outlined in the Irish Exemption Guidelines involving parental application, sharing of information, checklist of actions (Appendix 2) to be taken and the Certificate of Exemption.
- 2. The school will monitor every pupil with regards to whether, in the school's view, that the pupil might benefit from being considered for an Irish Exemption. The circular directs that any such application must be initiated by the parents / guardian. Therefore the school, will, in cases where it is of the view that a pupil might benefit from an Irish Exemption, proceed as follows:

- I. Support Teachers analysis of testing scores indicates it is likely a student may be eligible for an exemption, the following will take place:
- II. A consultation will take place between the Support Teacher and class teachers as to whether a student would benefit or not from an Irish Exemption. If in the experience of the teachers, it is felt they would not benefit, then an exemption will not be pursued until a parent makes an application.
- III. If it is felt the student would benefit from an exemption, the class teacher will consult with parents to ascertain if it is something the parents would like to pursue.
- IV. If the parents wish to pursue an exemption, the support teacher will ascertain through assessment whether the student fits the testing criteria.
- V. If the student fits the criteria, the school will begin the formal paperwork process.
- 3. A request from a class teacher
 - I. Support teacher will ascertain through assessment whether the student fits the testing criteria.
 - II. Of they fit the criteria, the class teacher will consult with the parents
 - III. If the parent / guardian wishes to proceed, the school will help them begin the formal paperwork process.

7.0 RECORDING THE DECISION

The outcome of the application process will be conveyed by the school principal in writing to the parent(s)/guardian(s).

Where an exemption is granted, a Certificate of Exemption, signed and dated by the school Principal will be issued (Appendix 3).

The Certificate of Exemption will also state the name and address of the school, the school roll number, the pupil's name, date of birth and the sub-paragraph under which the exemption is being granted.

Parents/guardians and pupils should be informed of the option not to exercise the exemption granted at that time, without any loss of the right to exercise it at a future time.

To support inclusive practice, pupils who are exempt from the study of Irish will be included in a meaningful way in aspects of Irish Language and cultural activities in line with his/her abilities and interests. Pupils will remain in the class during the Irish lesson so that they may have an opportunity to gain a knowledge of spoken Irish and to participate in the learning activities.

8.0 APPEAL PROCESS

Where the application for exemption from the study of Irish is refused, a parent/guardian can appeal the school's decision to the Irish Exemptions Appeal Committee (IEAC). The deliberations of the IEAC will focus solely on the process the school engaged in reaching its decision. The IEAC will consider how the school followed the process as prescribed in this Circular and the accompanying Guidelines for Primary Schools.

An appeal must be lodged with 30 calendar days from the date the decision of the school not to grant an exemption was notified in writing to the parent(s)/guardian(s). The Irish Exemptions Appeal Form and Guidelines for Primary schools can be accessed at:
